A cross-cutting Task and Finish group has been established by LGA to consider the opportunities and challenges that an ageing society presents and how local authorities might prepare themselves in the immediate and longer term to respond to these. The intention is for this programme to be completed and it's report published by March 2015.

We would welcome your views on the contribution that Local Government can offer, and the changes Local Government should make, to adjust to their local ageing communities and to maximize the opportunities for local citizens and communities to age better. The Housing LIN has been working with LGA, ADASS and housing and health sector leaders on a Memorandum of Understanding to instill leadership, learning and actions to deliver better joined up services for older people and vulnerable people.



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In addition, LAs need to be more enterprising in stimulating the environment and creating the conditions for 'place making' and inward capital investment to help transform local communities

5. How do local authorities need to adapt to enable older people to achieve their full potential?

<u>Leadership challenge</u>. Supported by Public Health England and industry, the Housing LIN is working with several local authorities, housing associations, public health, and other health sector organizations to provide opportunities for creating thinking, research and development and knowledge and innovation exchange so that the conditions can be put in place to improve the local 'offer' for older people in the region.

6. What are the key challenges facing local government in respect of health and social care as a result of population ageing? What needs to change (structurally, culturally or financially) to enable local government to tackle these challenges in cooperation with health and other partner organisations?

<u>Hidden need</u> (especially self -under market and those not known to the social care system) <u>Eligibility and affordability of care (</u>increasingly only critical and substan5tial ie it estimated that 500ik people no longer in receipt of home care due to tightening criteria <u>Impact of welfare reform</u> (new excluded groups, housing and income poverty)



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7. How is an 'ageing' strategy being developed in your area? What are the personnel, structures and processes necessary to support that strategy? What are the means by which 'buy-in' and engagement with the strategy are achieved? How is the strategy informed by the needs and aspirations of older people and how is integration achieved between officers and members and local authorities and partner organisations in the health and voluntary sectors?

The Housing LIN has been working closely with a NW authority on this. Due to report by the end of the year. Willing to share once published.

In addition, LGA are keynote address at the Houisng LIN annual conference on 17 February 2015

LAs therefore urgently need to produce robust age-friendly plans otherwise there will be a presumption in favour of developers
