We were interested in the LGA call for evidence, particularly as much of our recent ageing society work has tried to look beyond traditional care and support. Below are some examples of our work, I would be very happy to have a follow up conversation or provide more detail if helpful.

Dementia Friendly Communities

We have been working with partners in Yorkshire (predominantly York) to create dementia-friendly communities. This has involved looking beyond health and social care to who else can support local people to live well with dementia. We are in the process of evaluating this work (and other dementia-friendly initiatives in Scotland and Northern Ireland) and could share emerging findings next year. Neighbourhood Approach to Loneliness

Working with communities in York and Bradford we have developed a neighbourhood approach to loneliness. This has involved local people of all ages identifying the causes of loneliness in their community and working together on solutions to address loneliness. We have evaluated this community development approach; produced a resource pack for others wanting to do something similar in their communities and written a briefing paper for local authorities.

This was a five year programme which focused on older people with high support needs. As well as looking at care homes and housing, it reviewed alternative approaches to care and support.
